Every alumnus who reads the following program will want to attend our second Clinical Congress to be held in the White Memorial Dispensary on Sunday, March 11, 1934. There will be so many interesting and practical demonstrations and lectures that no one will be able to attend them all, but each can select the most interesting ones to him. A program such as this assures a profitable time for everyone, regardless of his preferences. The registration fee will be one dollar. Interns will not be charged a fee if they will mention to the registration clerk that they are interning.
