LADIES' AUXILIARY

It is just one year since eighty ladies met for a luncheon at the Jonathan Club in Los Angeles and took the first steps toward the organization of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Alumni Association of the College of Medical Evangelists.

The work of the Auxiliary is quite well known throughout Southern California, but for the benefit of others of our group who are scattered to the four corners of the globe, a brief summary of the activities of the past year may be of interest.

The first thing attempted was the organization of a chapter in each locality where it was possible to get together enough members. Mrs. Ford Cady served for a time as chairman of the Chapters Committee, but found it necessary to turn the responsibility to another. Mrs. Russell Starr accepted this position.

Mrs. William Christensen and Mrs. George Johnstone carried the work of the Commissary Department, distributing food and clothing furnished by the chapters, and bringing comfort and cheer to those families among Junior and Senior medical students who had met problems which threatened to hinder their progress if not to throw them out of school altogether.

The Auxiliary has collected many articles including linens, fomentation cloths, games, and other things to be distributed to our doctors in foreign lands. This year the recipients have been Dr. and Mrs. Frank Ingle, Class of '31, of the Malamulo Mission, Africa; Dr. and Mrs. Harold E. James, Class of '32, China; Dr. and Mrs. George H. Rue, Class of '24, Korea; Dr. and Mrs. D. W. Semmens, Class of '23, India; and Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Tonge, Class of '24, Africa.

The regular meetings of the Auxiliary are held on the first Wednesday of every other month. The meeting of May 3 was attended by one hundred and fifteen ladies. Following the luncheon a most interesting address was given by Mrs. Edythe Tate-Thompson, Chief of the Bureau of Tuberculosis of the State Department of Health. The ladies then went to Forest Lawn to view the famous "Last Supper" window.

Sunday, August 13, the Ladies' Auxiliary invited the Alumni to a social evening at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Wellesley Magan, at Covina. So many were away on vacations that only about one hundred were able to be present

but our gracious host and hostess made it an occasion to be remembered by those thus favored. Fruit punch was served and the guests left \$13.75 as a contribution to the funds of the Ladies' Auxiliary for its work.

The Board of nine members changes each year by the retirement of three members and the election of three new members. The Annual Meeting this year will be held September 6. The luncheon served in the Solarium of the Glendale Sanitarium will be followed by an address by Mrs. Kemper Campbell, with whom many of the readers are acquainted.

A ballot will be taken for the election of three new members to serve for the ensuing three years. Reports from the various chapters and committees will give a resume of the year's activities.

As the new president takes up the responsibility of leading out for the new year, I bespeak for her the same hearty cooperation and helpful, sympathetic interest in all the activities of the Auxiliary extended to me and to our Executive Board. One short year, and that the first year of our organization, has not given us time to develop all the plans started, so the Auxiliary faces its second year with much to dare in a field of great need and wonderful opportunity.

We want to thank the Alumni Association for their encouragement expressed to us through their President, and their helpfulness in very material ways.

It is our desire to have the wife of every alumnus of the A.M.M.C. and the C.M.E., also the wife of every member of the C.M.E. Faculty, a member of our Ladies' Auxiliary.
